ERNEST JOB

Ernest Job entered my life 25 years ago when he and Winnie volunteered to assist with the Parktown and Westcliff Heritage Trust. Winnie was keen to become a guide and Ernie was there to support whatever she did. The spin-off for us was that year after year he took on more and more, expanding our Heritage Weekends especially so that they became quite unthinkable without Ernie and the Job Family. He trained himself as a first class navigator, learned the capabilities of buses and bus drivers, which corners they could handle and which trees must be avoided. He taught us the rules of navigating tours – concentrating on the route and the driver, and watching in case the planned stopping or slowing down just wasn't possible. He even taught many tour leaders that we simply had to keep to time if we wanted the bus to take us back to the school.

Ernie coped with the crises and foibles which he knew were inevitable and he did so with good humour, ever ready to laugh after the event.

My son William swears this story is true:

On one occasion, I think it was the mining tour to the East Rand the bus was rather full of old ladies. One old dear tottered to the front of the bus and offered him a handful of almonds. "Please take them. Our teeth just can't cope with the nuts."

So he graciously accepted and ate the almonds. About 20 minutes later she repeated her totter to the front. Collapsing in his arms as the bus navigated a corner, she said: "Here are some more. I hope you enjoy them." He managed to get her back to her seat and once again ate up all the almonds. He was concentrating hard on the next turn off which should have been to ERPM when down the aisle she tottered yet again. This time she had to sit on the occasional lap as the bus turned the corner. He accepted the almonds, but said: "Why do you buy almonds if you can't eat them? "She replied: "Oh we don't buy the almonds, we just love the chocolate coating!"

It is hard now to remember the times when the buses broke down and even got lost, because once Ernie had taken over the organisation of our bus tours, we had no disasters. He created a built a new set-up ensuring that the sound system worked so that both upstairs and downstairs could enjoy the words of wisdom from the guides and also enjoy the views over garden walls.

When we changed name to the Johannesburg Heritage Foundation he joined Winnie on the Board of Management and astounded me by his always sensible advice on committee rules. Afterwards I remembered just how many committee meetings Ernie must have endured. He served on PTA's when his children were at school. The Parish Council and committees for church functions. Then came the Friends of the James Hall Transport Museum. I am not sure if he attended any board meetings for the S.A. Blood Transfusion Service, but he literally gave buckets of blood in his lifetime as a donor, truly a National Service.

To the Parktown and Westcliff Heritage Trust and its successor the Johannesburg Heritage Foundation, Ernie was a treasured and most valued member. I know we will miss his energy and resourcefulness more and more as time goes by. We have been promised though that his son James will be coming to fill his shoes.

They are big shoes you'll be filling, dear James. Very, very, big shoes and to all his family I want to say: be proud and walk tall in his footsteps. He was a lovely person, a generous and honourable human being and a very fine man.

He gave so much more than he ever received.

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WALKING TOUR 'HILLBROW'

SATURDAY, 30th APRIL

We venture into one of Johannesburg's oldest suburbs, which has changed dramatically time and again.

Hillbrow first went high-rise from the late 1920's, boomed after World War 11 and continued expanding higher and higher with blocks of flats getting bigger and bigger in what Clive Chipkin describes as Gigantism. Yet there are still remnants from the early Twentieth Century.

We start beyond the walls of The Fort with the house of the Prison Governor, guarded now by a kindly angel at the street corner, pass the magnificent Pabst building known to oldies as the Colin Gordon nursing Home, then to the Hugh Solomon block which was the first nurses' home, admire the proudly maintained Alpine Court to visit the Friedenskirche.

Then up past the old Andre Huguenot theatre to Kotze Street and Highpoint; down Edith Cavell for the fresh food market, down Twist and Goldreich Streets to admire fine Art Deco buildings and back up the hill to the old Police Officers Club. Several blocks of flats ensure the architectural interest of this tour, but of course the real fascination lies in the wonderful mix, which has made Hillbrow such an attraction.

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WALKING TOUR 'ANSTEYS AND ITS NEIGHBOURS'

SATURDAY, 7th MAY

The 3rd Anstey's building is Johannesburg's most celebrated art deco edifice. Designed by the renowned practice of Emley and Williamson in 1935, this dramatic ziggurat rising off a podium occupied by the prestigious Norman Anstey & Company department store once dominated the Joburg skyline. The most elegant apartment address in the City, the building was also famous for the magnificent window-dressing seen through the large plate glass shop fronts of Norman Anstey's.

Its neighbour, Manners Mansions, was designed two years later by the same practice, and echoes its setback to open up the view of the sky in an extraordinary manner.

Saved from demolition in 1989, when the developer's architect refused to apply for a permit, Anstey's has been brought back to life by a group of committed preservationists, and its apartments have recently become sought after places to live. We will explore the history and architecture of Anstey's and its neighbours with heritage architect Brian McKechnie.

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WALKING TOUR 'KING EDWARD VII SCHOOL'

KES is a product of the Milner administration, which brought excellent, if Anglocentric, education to post-1902 Johannesburg. Originally housed in a vacant cigar factory on the corner of Gold and Kerk Streets in Johannesburg, it soon moved to Barnato Park where it was established in the mansion that originally had been designed for Barney Barnato. But these premises also proved inadequate, and in 1911 the school was finally moved to a new site on the Houghton Ridge, provided by Barnato's Johannesburg Consolidated Investments at half its market value.

It has magnificent buildings and grounds and a proud history, but this is not an institution stuck in the past. The school has had the foresight to appoint heritage architect Joy Campkin-Smith to guide the renewal of existing heritage structures at the school, and to provide for the school's growth with exciting, new buildings. Her re-imagining of the old gymnasium into a Media Centre and Museum won the 2013 GlfA Award, and she will be leading a very fortunate group through this and more recent projects at the school.

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MEMBERS ONLY MUSEUM TOUR 'THE HOLOCAUST AND GENOCIDE CENTRE'

Established in January 2008, the Johannesburg Holocaust and Genocide Centre (JHGC) is dedicated to Holocaust and genocide education and memory. The JHGC will be opening this year in a building designed by Johannesburg architect Lewis Levin. Levin used the memories of Holocaust and Rwandan genocide survivors to inform the building's material and form. It is a powerful statement, haunted by landscapes of death, but one that primarily aims to teach tolerance and compassion.

Members of the JHF are fortunate to be among the first visitors of the JHGC, and will be given an introduction to the aims of the Centre, explore its architecture, and be able to view a temporary exhibition on display.

It sounds like a five to six course lunch, but simple Chinese-style, and it comes with a talk on the history of the Chinese in the area.
